

The Sickle Cell and Thalassaemia Service For Adults and Young People

Information sheet

Introduction

The catchment area of University Hospital Lewisham has a population of great ethnic diversity and there is a high prevalence of Sickle Cell Disease. They are looked after by the Haemoglobinopathy department at the hospital. The Department also cares for people with Thalassaemia major.

The children's Sickle Cell and Thalassaemia service is expanding rapidly and children transfer to the adult services when they are sixteen. This means that that patient numbers are increasing steadily in the adult service, both as a result of the transfer process and because of population migration.

Emergency admissions

Emergency admissions are usually via the Acute Medical team, who will work with the Haematology team to look after the patients. The Haematology team will take over the care of some of the patients the day after admission, particularly those whose condition is not responding so well to treatment. The Clinical Nurse Specialist is a key member of the Haematology team.

A doctor from the Haematology team will see all admitted patients the following day at the latest, or urgently the same day depending on your condition.

Please make sure that your admitting team tell the Haematology team that you are in hospital, even if you are doing well!

Patients with Sickle Cell Disease or Thalassaemia who require an emergency admission are usually admitted to Chestnut ward first of all (ext: 8815), and then transferred to Laurel ward if they will be staying longer (ext: 3777/8755). Sometimes, you may be admitted to another ward. Visiting times are 3-8pm.

The Clinical Nurse Specialist monitors both ward and A&E attendance of the Sickle Cell patients and plans any necessary care. They work with the Haematology team and the Community Haemoglobinopathy team, so you may hear from us if you have recently come to A&E.

Clinics

There is a weekly Sickle Cell Disease and Thalassaemia clinic on most Wednesday afternoons in Suite 4 from 2 – 5.30pm. This is a follow-up clinic where hospital staff and the Community Haemoglobinopathy team meet with you. You will discuss your long term care and any medical problems will be addressed.

Hydroxycarbamide, transfusion therapy and treatments for iron overload are monitored in this clinic and other routine care is also given, including Annual Review.

The Transition Clinic is designed for young people reaching the age of 16 who are ready to move to the adult services. This also takes place on a Wednesday afternoon in Suite 4 from 2 – 5.30pm once every three months. Clinical staff from both adult and children's teams meet the patients and their families.

Other new patients are seen in Suite 8 for their first visit, in a general New Patient clinic where patients with other conditions are also seen. You will be transferred to the Sickle Cell Disease and Thalassaemia Clinic for your next appointment.

It is likely that you will have been given a form to have a blood sample taken before your clinic appointment. This takes place in Suite 1, which is open 8am to 4.30pm Monday to Friday.

Patients who need blood transfusions, including routine exchange transfusion, receive their treatment in Suite 8, which is open 9.30am to 5pm Monday to Friday. Suite 8 contact numbers are extension 8601 (Reception) or extension 8521 (Nurses Station).
